

THE LESSONS

The Old Testament Lesson

Exodus 12:1-11

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt, "This month shall be for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell all the congregation of Israel that on the tenth day of this month they shall take every man a lamb according to their fathers' houses, a lamb for a household; and if the household is too small for a lamb, then a man and his neighbor next to his house shall take according to the number of persons; according to what each can eat you shall make your count for the lamb. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a male a year old; you shall take it from the sheep or from the goats; and you shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month, when the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel shall kill their lambs in the evening. Then they shall take some of the blood, and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat them. They shall eat the flesh that night, roasted; with unleavened bread and bitter herbs they shall eat it. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled with water, but roasted, its head with its legs and its inner parts. And you shall let none of it remain until the morning, anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. In this manner you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it in haste. It is the LORD's passover."

The Gospel

Luke 22:14-30

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Saint Luke.

And he said to them, "The kings of the Gentiles exercise lordship over them; and those in authority over them are called benefactors. But not so with you; rather let the greatest among you become as the youngest, and the leader as one who serves. For which is the greater, one who sits at table, or one who serves? Is it not the one who sits at table? But I am among you as one who serves."

THE MANDATUM The Washing of Feet

On the night of the Last Supper, when Jesus instituted the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist, he said, "I am among you as one who serves," and showed us an example of this humility and service by washing the feet of his disciples. This was a sign of his New Commandment (Latin-mandatum) and hence the name for this day: Maundy (Commandment) Thursday.

Twelve representatives of the congregation have been chosen to represent the twelve disciples.

The Celebrant turns to the people and introduces the enacting of the Mandatum.

A READING FROM THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO ST. JOHN

John 13:1-20, 34-35

Now before the feast of the Passover, when Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart out of this world to the Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. And during supper, when the devil had already put it into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him, Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, rose from supper, laid aside his garments, and girded himself with a towel. Then he poured water into a basin, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel with which he was girded.

He came to Simon Peter; and Peter said to him, "Lord, do you wash my feet?" Jesus answered him, "What I am doing you do not know now, but afterward you will understand." Peter said to him, "You shall never wash my feet." Jesus answered him, "If I do not wash you, you have no part in me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "He who has bathed does not need to wash, except for his feet, but he is clean all over; and you are clean, but not every one of you." For he knew who was to betray him; that was why he said, "You are not all clean."

The choir sings Ubi caritas by Maurice Duruflé as the foot-washing is completed.

Where there is charity and love, God is there. The love of Christ has gathered us together. Let us rejoice and be glad in it. Let us revere and love the living God. And from a sincere heart let us love one another. Amen.

When the foot-washing is completed, the lector resumes the lesson

When he had washed their feet, and taken his garments, and resumed his place, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord; and you are right, for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you.

Truly, I say to you, a servant is not greater than his master; nor is he who is sent greater than he who sent him. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them. I am not speaking of you all; I know whom I have chosen; it is that the scripture may be fulfilled, 'He who ate my bread has lifted his heel against me.' I tell you this now, before it takes place, that when it does take place you may believe that I am he. Truly, I say to you, he who receives any one whom I send receives me; and he who receives me receives him who sent me."

"A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."





We do earnestly repent, and are heartily sorry for these our misdoings; the remembrance of them is grievous unto us, the burden of them is intolerable. Have mercy upon us, have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, forgive us all that is past; and grant that we may ever hereafter serve and please thee in newness of life, to the honor and glory of thy Name; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



A LL glory be to thee, Almighty God, our heavenly Father, for that thou, of thy tender mercy, didst give thine only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption; who made there, by his one oblation of himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and on this night did institute, and in his holy Gospel command us to continue, a perpetual memory of that his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again.

For in the night in which he was betrayed, even this night, he took bread; and when he had given thanks to thee, he brake it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my Body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, he took the cup; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink ye all of this; for this is my Blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins. Do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me."

Wherefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of thy dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we, thy humble servants, do celebrate and make here before thy divine Majesty, with these thy holy gifts, which we now offer unto thee, the memorial thy Son hath commanded us to make; having in remembrance his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; rendering unto thee most hearty thanks for the innumerable benefits procured unto us by the same.

And we most humbly beseech thee, O merciful Father, to hear us; and, of thy almighty goodness, vouchsafe to bless and sanctify, with thy Word and Holy Spirit, these thy gifts and creatures of bread and wine; that we, receiving them according to thy Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

And we earnestly desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; most humbly beseeching thee to grant that, by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we, and all thy whole Church, may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present unto thee, O Lord, our selves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice unto thee; humbly beseeching thee that we, and all others who shall be partakers of this Holy Communion, may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of thy Son Jesus Christ, be filled with thy grace and heavenly benediction, and made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

And although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer unto thee any sacrifice, yet we beseech thee to accept this our bounden duty and service, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord; By whom, and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, all honor and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. *AMEN*.

Instructions for Holy Communion

All Christians who have been baptized with water and in the Name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, who come forward in faith and are permitted to receive Holy Communion in their own church, are welcome to do so on this occasion.

Communion is received in the following way: a priest places the Bread in the palm of your hand, which you then consume; to receive the Wine, hold the base of the chalice and guide it to your lips. The practice of dipping the Bread into the Wine is not permitted. If you do not wish to receive one or both Elements, simply cross your arms over your chest and the priest will give you a blessing.

For those with a medical need, Wine from a dedicated gluten-free chalice is available at the Low Altar.

If one is not able (e.g. because of a medical condition), or prefers not to receive either the Bread or the Wine, the Church has always taught that a person still receives all the benefits of Holy Communion.

THE PROCESSION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT TO THE ALTAR OF REPOSE

As the hymn is sung, the Blessed Sacrament is carried through the midst of the people. The Blessed Sacrament is taken to the Altar of Repose (in Memorial Chapel). There, the Sacrament will be reserved throughout the night and the people will keep vigil with the Lord, in response to his request to his disciples:

"Could you not watch with me one hour?"

THE STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

The people remain kneeling as the Altar and Sanctuary are stripped of all ornament and appointments. As this takes place, the following psalm is chanted by the choir.

M Y God, my God, look upon me; why hast thou forsaken me: and art so far from my health, and from the words of my complaint? O my God, I cry in the daytime, but thou hearest not:

and in the night-season also I take no rest.

And thou continuest holy:

O thou worship of Israel.

Our fathers hoped in thee:

they trusted in thee, and thou didst deliver them.

They called upon thee, and were holpen:

they put their trust in thee, and were not confounded.

But as for me, I am a worm, and no man:

a very scorn of men, and the outcast of the people.

All they that see me laugh me to scorn:

they shoot our their lips, and shake their heads, saying,

He trusted in the LORD, that he would deliver him:

let him deliver him, if he will have him.

But thou art he that took me out of my mother's womb:

thou wast my hope, when I hanged yet upon my mother's breasts.

I have been left unto thee ever since I was born:

thou art my God, even from my mother's womb.

O go not from me, for trouble is hard at hand:

and there is none to help me.

Many oxen are come about me:

fat bulls of Bashan close me in on every side.

They gape upon me with their mouths:

as it were a ramping and a roaring lion.

I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint:

my heart also in the midst of my body is even like melting wax.

My strength is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue cleaveth to my gums :

and thou shalt bringest me into the dust of death.

For many dogs are come about me:

and the council of the wicked layeth siege against me.

They pierced my hands and my feet; I may tell all my bones:

they stand staring and looking upon me.

They part my garments among them:

and casts lots upon my vesture.

But be not thou far from me, O LORD:

thou art my succour, haste thee to help me.

Deliver my soul from the sword:

my darling from the power of the dog.

Save me from the lion's mouth:

thou hast heard me also from among the horns of the unicorns.

I will declare thy Name unto my brethren:

in the midst of the congregation will I praise thee.

O praise the LORD, ye that fear him: magnify him, all ye of the seed of Jacob,

and fear him, all ye seed of Israel.

For he hath not despised, nor abhorred, the low estate of the poor :

he hath not hid his face from him, but when he called unto him he heard him.

My praise is of thee in the great congregation:

my vows will I perform in the sight of them that fear him.

The poor shall eat and be satisfied:

they that seek after the LORD shall praise him; your heart shall live for ever.

All the ends of the world shall remember themselves, and be turned unto the LORD:

and all the kindreds of the nations shall worship before him.

For the kingdom is the LORD's:

THE AGONY IN THE GARDEN

Matthew 26:30-46

When the Sanctuary is completely bare and the psalm has ended, the Deacon reads the account of Jesus' Agony in the Garden.

And when they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. Then Jesus said to them, "You will all fall away because of me this night; for it is written, 'I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep of the flock will be scattered.' But after I am raised up, I will go before you to Galilee." Peter declared to him, "Though they all fall away because of you, I will never fall away." Jesus said to him, "Truly, I say to you, this very night, before the cock crows, you will deny me three times." Peter said to him, "Even if I must die with you, I will not deny you." And so said all the disciples.

Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane, and he said to his disciples, "Sit here, while I go yonder and pray." And taking with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, he began to be sorrowful and troubled. Then he said to them, "My soul is very sorrowful, even to death; remain here, and watch with me." And going a little farther he fell on his face and prayed, "My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me; nevertheless, not as I will, but as thou wilt." And he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, "So, could you not watch with me one hour? Watch and pray that you may not enter into temptation; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." Again, for the second time, he went away and prayed, "My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, thy will be done." And again he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy. So, leaving them again, he went away and prayed for the third time, saying the same words. Then he came to the disciples and said to them, "Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? Behold, the hour is at hand, and the Son of man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Rise, let us be going; see, my betrayer is at hand."
