
DIASPORA



When the Babylonians destroyed Jerusalem, God's people were taken from their land and scattered throughout a strange place. The process of scattering is called diaspora. The written Torah reminded them of God's strong faithfulness and brought hope for the future.

Before the exile, God's word was spoken and heard. During the diaspora, God's word was written on scrolls and called **Torah**, which means "law." The Torah includes the first five books in the Jewish and Christian Bibles.

2 Kings 25:1-12

God's people had been removed from their homeland and spread throughout a foreign country. The people believed they would only be God's people if they lived in the Promised Land. Over time the people came to trust that God's word would sustain them during these dark days.
