RETURN



God's people could now return to Israel, but they could never go back to who they were before the exile. The Israelites knew that the only way forward required them to trust God to help them rebuild and move to the future.

It took about sixty years, but God's people made a **U-turn** in Babylon and returned home to Jerusalem. God encouraged the people to return to faithfulness by repenting of, or turning around from, past sins.

Ezra 1:1–4

The Persian military, led by King Cyrus, took control of Babylon. As a result, God's people were allowed to return home to Jerusalem. Many were excited to be back in the land God had given them. Others were horrified to see what was left of the city.
